The Need for Leadership

The Agricultural Leadership Program

The Agricultural Leadership Program is a resource for leaders trying to contribute to a better future for Hawaii's agricultural sector and rural communities. The Program seeks out participants with diverse backgrounds and interests who have demonstrated a commitment to lead and who wish to broaden their knowledge and enhance their leadership skills.


The Program's core curriculum includes:

- collaborative decision making
- facilitative leadership
- strategic thinking
- planning and group process skills

Participants will:

- form a network of associates they can call upon when they need assistance
- expand their horizons beyond their own industry or community
- see that challenges and opportunities cross industry and community lines and can be better addressed when dealt with collaboratively

The Program is composed of a series of eight three or four day seminars and a 14-day national trip held over a period of 16 months. Seminars are held around the State and focus on local and state issues. On the national trip one week is spent in Washington, D.C. studying national and international issues impacting the agricultural sector and rural communities. The second week is spent studying agricultural and rural community systems in a state selected by the class.
