RIPPCURL: Repurposing Invasive Plants in Punalu'u to Create Useful Recycling of Land-waste

The RIPPCURL Capstone Project will be a feasibility study to answer this question: Can an economically sound business model be created where invasive plants are removed from Punalu'u ag parcels and transported to an on-site biomass processing facility where the green waste is converted into beneficial products such as mulch, bio-fuel, and biomass?

Whose Meat is This? Building Collaborative Leadership for Community-based Subsistence Hunting

Using the state's Community-Based Subsistence Fishing Area program for guidance, this project explores a roadmap for developing a similar program for Community-Based Subsistence Hunting. The intended use for this draft program outline/manual is as a springboard for working with Game Program sponsors, partners, collaborators, and cooperators—including public and private landowners, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the State Board of Land and Natural Resources, the State Legislature, and the new State Game Management Advisory Commission—to assess the desirability of a community-based approach to public hunting; identify and mobilize leadership for implementing such an approach; and help people to bring home the bacon, harmoniously.

Pictorial Pest Guide for Non-English Speaking Farmers

The goal of this project is to increase access of non-English speaking farmers to the knowledge and services provided by both public and private entities in the topic of pest management. A pilot program will be conducted targeting a group of about 30 Thai speaking farmers in Kunia.

Maui Based, Grass-fed Stocker Operation

This project is a proposal to create a centralized grass based stocker operation on Maui utilizing irrigated pastures to create a consistent, naturally raised local beef product. This all-in-one service will take a calf to finished weight, slaughter, process, package, and custom label based on marketing strategies developed by the individual operation.
